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Threat exchange: Iran warns of sustained retaliation as Trump says 'very big things' are coming

- Iran's Khatam al-Anbiya Central Headquarters warned Sunday on state media that it had information the U.S. is preparing a big new attack; any fresh attack would trigger sustained retaliation against U.S. bases and interests, and regional allies assisting Washington would be considered parties to the conflict. It gave no details. — [Reuters](#)
- Trump told Fox News on Sept 20 he is in 'deciding mode' on Iran: 'My question is, if and when do I blow the entire nation up? They better behave.' He said 'very big things' could happen soon and outlined three outcomes — a deal, economic pressure, or military action — while saying he is open to meeting Pezeshkian at UNGA this week. — [CNN](#)
- Nearly seven months into the war, neither side has looked ready to make major concessions; there have been no publicly reported U.S. strikes on Iran for more than two weeks. — [CNN](#)

Alert wave widens: U.S. Embassy in Israel joins the warnings

- The U.S. Embassy in Israel issued a security alert Saturday over escalated Houthi-Saudi fighting; other missions, including the U.S. virtual embassy in Iran, issued similar alerts warning of rapid escalation and travel disruption. — [Times of Israel](#)
- The State Department's Saturday alert warned of the potential for rapid escalation across the Middle East and told Americans to exercise heightened vigilance and expect possible flight cancellations and airspace closures. — [Reuters](#)
- The U.S. Embassy in Saudi Arabia separately restricted U.S. government personnel travel to the cities of Taif and Yanbu without special authorization. — [CNN](#)
- This widens last night's four confirmed same-day alerts (Baghdad, Riyadh, Manama, Beirut); the wider ten-mission list stays unverified beyond the newly confirmed missions. — [Briefing](#)

Riyadh aftermath: coalition confirms dawn intercept; Trump in contact with Houthis

- The Houthis claimed missile and drone strikes on 'sensitive' sites in Riyadh and a major oil facility in Yanbu on Saturday; Saudi Arabia confirmed it intercepted a ballistic missile fired toward Riyadh at dawn, and the coalition said it foiled other attacks. Reuters video showed a massive plume of black smoke near Riyadh's main airport. — [Reuters](#)
- Trump said his administration remains in contact with the Houthis and is avoiding direct U.S. military involvement in the group's conflict with Saudi Arabia. — [CNN](#)
- Context: Beijing privately asked Tehran to rein in the Houthis after a Saudi appeal (Reuters, Sept 17), as the conflict spills across energy routes China depends on; Tehran answered that stability depends on ending the U.S.-Israeli war on Iran. — [Reuters](#)

Death-toll dispute: Washington Post reports at least 22 U.S. dead; Hegseth calls it 'a complete LIE'

- The Washington Post, citing six U.S. officials familiar with Pentagon internal casualty accounting, reported at least 22 service members have died since Feb 28 — four more than the 18 in the public DCAS database; a sixth official said 23. Three U.S. contractors also died. Not all undisclosed deaths were necessarily tied directly to combat. — [Washington Post \(via Reuters\)](#)
- Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth called the report 'a complete LIE,' 'DISGUSTING and FAKE,' and said the Post is 'worse than Iranian state media.' The Pentagon declined to address the newspaper's questions about the discrepancy. — [Washington Post \(via Reuters\)](#)

The blockade by the numbers: 109 ships redirected

- CENTCOM said on X that as of Sept 20 its forces have redirected 109 commercial vessels to ensure compliance with the U.S. naval blockade of Iranian ports, enforcement of which resumed July 14. — [U.S. Central Command](#)
- Tehran's three conditions for ending the war — end the war on all fronts, release frozen assets, end the blockade — still await Trump's response, with UNGA week opening Monday. — Briefing

Trump back from Camp David a day early — White House gives no reason

- Trump returned to the White House on Saturday evening, a day ahead of schedule, cutting his Camp David stay short; the change was confirmed by White House pool reporting. The White House gave no explanation, and no outlet has tied the return to any single event. — [Wall Street Journal](#)
- Correction: last night's briefing held this claim as unverified, saying reporting indicated he was staying through the weekend. It is now confirmed, so the record is corrected. — Briefing

What to watch next

- Whether the confirmed airport fire and dawn intercept trigger a Saudi retaliation or activate Turkey's offer of military support under the new pact. — Briefing
- Whether the alert wave expands to more missions, and whether the language moves from vigilance to something harder. — Briefing
- The Pentagon's answer — or silence — on the casualty-accounting dispute with the Washington Post. — Briefing
- Whether Trump and Pezeshkian meet at UNGA in New York — the first real diplomatic window since Iran sent its conditions via Qatar. — Briefing
